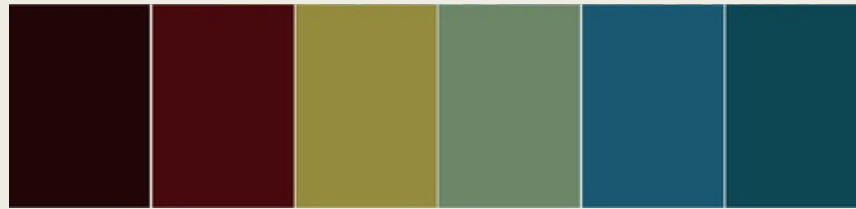


# Style



# Color

In scenes that are more serious and less comedic, we see darker shades of vibrant colors like the ones located below. These darker shades are typically used in indoor scenes or when a character is experiencing a serious moment. The colors used in this film are similar to the cinematography of Wes Anderson films.
